#### SETTING THE CONTEXT FOR WHAT WE HAVE LEARNT SO FAR ABOUT THE IMPACT OF THE PANDEMIC ON THE THIRD SECTOR

Session 1 will provide an overview of key learnings from the period of the COVID-19 pandemic drawing on research about the Third Sector response in the West Midlands. The session will also look at the current landscape and the immediate future for the Third Sector as well as considering the social, economic and cultural context. Contributors will touch on changes to volunteering trends (including post-pandemic fatigue); changes to employment trends, particularly across the 50yrs+ age group; changes to working practices, eg. remote, virtual and digital capacity, and the capability and resilience of the sector and the communities they work with.


